Notice of Accreditation Survey

The Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care, Inc. (AAAHC) Accreditation Association will conduct an accreditation survey of Fond du Lac Human Services Division Jan. 22-24.

The survey will be used to evaluate the organization's compliance with AAAHC standards for ambulatory health care and to determine if accreditation should be awarded to, or retained by, the organization.

Through an emphasis on education and consultation, the ultimate purpose of the accreditation process is to improve the quality of health care delivered by this organization.

FDLHSD has voluntarily requested this survey as a means of having a review of the entire organization to build upon strengths or identify opportunities to improve the delivery of quality health care.

Members of the general public, patients, and individuals on the staff of this organization, believing that they have pertinent and valid information about this organization's provision of health care or compliance with AAAHC standards, may

request an information presentation with AAAHC surveyors at the time of the survey for the purpose of presenting such information, or may communicate such information in writing or by telephone to the AAAHC. All information received from identified individuals at or prior to the survey will be considered in making the accreditation decision. The information presented will not be debated with the reporting individual.

Requests for presentation must be received at least two weeks prior to the survey in order to allow sufficient time to schedule the presentations.

This Notice of Accreditation Survey is posted in accordance with AAAHC requirements, and may not be removed until after the survey. Date posted: Nov. 1 2012 Sarah Murray Administrative Services Coordinator.

Instructions

AAAHC policy requires that an announcement of the date of the survey and an opportunity for public presentation be posted on the organization's premises in all facilities in a manner intended to give public notice thirty (30) days prior to the scheduled survey date.

For organizations undergoing an AAAHC/Medicare Deemed Status survey, the notice must be completed and posted not later than the first day of the assigned ninety (90) day survey window, and remain posted until the survey is completed.

In any case, the notice must remain posted for a period of not less than 30 days.

The date and the name and title of the person responsible for posting should be recorded on the notice when it is posted

It is required that the notice be displayed at all facilities, including each satellite, in

locations such as the lobby, reception or cashier area, usual bulletin board or other public area, and that it be posted at least as conspicuously as is the AAAHC accreditation certificate. This notice must be posted in appropriately prominent places so that large segments of the population served are likely to view it. If additional copies are needed, photocopies of this notice may be made. The notice of Accreditation Survey is also available at www.aaahc.org.

At the time of the survey, AAAHC surveyors are required to verify when and in what manner the notice was posted in the organization.

Minnesota Chippewa Tribe Member Survey

The Minnesota Chippewa Tribe (MCT) is conducting a survey to help us learn more about the blood quantum of MCT members and their descendants. About 2,500 enrolled MCT members have been randomly selected and invited (by sending them a letter) to participate in this study – all MCT Band members eighteen (18) years of age and older had an equal chance of being sampled. MCT hired Wilder Research to conduct this survey. We started contacting sampled MCT members in Dec. 2012. If you were invited, we hope you decide to participate. Your participation and accurate information are very important to the success of this survey.

If you want to complete the survey (even if you were not sampled) you may go to www.wildersurveys.org/mct2 and use your enrollment ID number to log on to the secure web survey. We encourage all MCT members who are interested to complete the survey. All MCT members who complete the survey will be entered into a drawing for several great prizes including play and stay packages from our Reservation's casinos, and Wisdom Steps special promotion discount cards.

We will use the information from this survey to determine what other tribal affiliations (non- MCT) exists within families of enrolled members. No individual enrollment statuses will be changed as the result of this survey – it is for information gathering purposes only.

Seasonal safety and maintenance tips from FDL Housing Division

Once the holiday season is over it will be time to get rid of that Christmas tree and put away all of the holiday decorations, and the sooner the better. One of

the major contributors to winter season house fires is, of course, your dried out Christmas tree and over loaded outlets or circuits. Unplug those Christmas tree lights and pack them away. Look for the nearest exit door to the outside of your house and throw that tree out. After you have tackled that job check your household fire extinguisher and make sure it has a full charge, if not recharge it or replace it. Your next job is to check and test all smoke detectors, and replace batteries if needed. Now you are ready for the second half of a wonderful safe long winter season.

Tribal snowmobile registration now recognized by state

The State of Minnesota now officially recognizes tribal snowmobile registration. Although the Band has been issuing snowmobile license plates for years, the state statutes have never recognized tribal snowmobile registration. As a result, state conservation officers would occasionally claim that the Band's snowmobile license plates were only valid on the Fond du Lac Reservation.

Earlier this year, the Band successfully lobbied the state legislature to address this issue. Minnesota statutes now recognize registration if the snowmobile is "registered by an Indian tribal government to a tribal member and has not been outside the tribal reservation boundary for more than 30 consecutive days." Although tribal snowmobile registration is now recognized, the State Department of Natural Resources guidelines indicate that a Snowmobile State Trail Sticker is still required to use state and grant-in-aid trails.

The cost of the sticker is \$36 per year. The new law is located at Minn. Stat. § 84.82, subd. 6. There is no longer any question about the validity of the Band's authority to register snowmobiles.

GED classes can help gain the skills to take the GED test. Classes can also be used as refreshers for people going back to school.

Classes are now being offered at the Brookston Center (Tuesdays and Thursdays 12:30-3:30 p.m.), Cloquet Center Library (Wednesday and Thursdays 5-8 p.m.), the Damiano Center in Duluth (Mondays and Wednesdays 10-12 p.m. and Thursday from 5-7 p.m.), and the Sawyer Center (Wednesdays 5:30-8:30

p.m. and Friday 11:30-2:30 p.m.). GED classes are open to Band members, FDL family, FDL Employees, and members of Federally Recognized tribes.

A few thoughts from RBC members

From the Chairwoman

Members of the Fond du Lac Band have always been proud of the Min-no-aya-Win Clinic and the Human Services Division. The level and breadth of care we all enjoy at the clinic has been over thirty years in the making. We have services available at our clinic that other tribes wish that they could have. We host other tribes regularly to our clinic so they can learn how we do it, with the hopes that they can replicate what we have in their own community. We have grown to operate two full service facilities and three pharmacies.

Those are the things that we can see. What you don't see is the incredible leadership that our staff has had in Indian Country in developing and promoting Indian health care policy. With the federal approval of the Affordable Care Act (Obamacare), the Indian Health Care Improvement Act (IHCIA) was permanently reauthorized. This is important because previously the IHCIA needed re-authorization every ten years.

The complicated work of how the Affordable Care Act would impact members of tribes then began. States were authorized to begin discussions with medical insurance providers to set up health insurance exchanges. Native Americans are to be exempt from the Affordable Care Act's provisions that mandate having health insurance or face fines from the Internal Revenue Service. Phil Norrgard, Human Services Division Director, is to be commended for the role he has been playing in looking out for tribal members in the

development of the state insurance exchanges and for identifying issues before they become problems. All of his knowledge and hard work will benefit not only the people of Fond du Lac but all tribal members and their descendents who rely on Indian Health facilities across the country. Thank you for your leadership, Phil!

President Obama once again hosted tribal leaders at the 4th Tribal Leaders Conference on Dec. 5. President Obama and members of his cabinet were in attendance. Small group meetings were arranged around different topic areas to give feedback and hear new information on the administration's efforts with tribes. It is to the benefit of tribes that President Obama

will be in office for 4 more years, since he truly has a level of commitment to tribal people. As evidence of that commitment is the settlement of the Cobell litigation.

One piece of that settlement is funding for tribes to buy back allotment land that is fractionated, or in other words, has too many heirs for a family to agree on how to use it. Some of the fractionated pieces have gone out of trust because the heirs were not enrollees. At a small group meeting with Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar, five other Tribal leaders and myself, had a conversation about how to implement this part of the Cobell settlement. This will help Fond du Lac regain control of some parcels of land within our borders.

Hello all

Our community center has a number of upcoming events. The Jr Golf program offered by our golf pro Dan Walker started in December and will be held twice a month at the community centers throughout the winter. This includes golf lessons, how to swing a club, game etiquette, and other information relating to the game of golf. Also at the CCC, there will be indoor practice for those 16 and up to practice their swing; the golf nets will be up every Saturday morning from 9:45-11 a.m.

The Youth Activity Crew (YAC) was started in November after the first community meeting that was held in Cloquet and now meets every week. They

are now up to approximately 50 participants and each week they participate in an activity that they planned the previous month. The YAC is open to those 11 years and older from all FDL districts.

Our staff has organized a Family Movie Morning program for our families to participate in two weekends a month. They also hold a bead-ing class 7 days a week and all supplies for your projects are provided for through the community center. Our Red Cross babysitting classes were offered for the first time during the holiday break in December. It will be offered every other month throughout the year to children 11 yrs and up. This is a successful course for youths looking for babysitting jobs. We are also

YEAR-IN-REVIEW

Another year has come and gone, and for some of us it has just flown by. It was a rollercoaster of a year, but that just seems to be how life goes. The 2012 year started out on a somber note, the Brookston Representative, Mary Northrup, had passed away in December and the community was still hurting from the loss.

February is when things seemed to take a positive turn. Joseph Bauer's efforts to help the community by raising money so that the police department could afford a new K-9 had worked. Kaylee was bought and trained and Sgt. Casey Rennquist had a K9 back at his side. It was Bauer's determination that got this program started, and it was really quite amazing to hear his passion when we talked about it back in March.

"I asked him (police chief Ojibway) 'how much does a dog cost,' and he said, '\$7000.' I said 'maybe I can raise that for you.'" Bauer said.

March's high bottomed out as the high school boys basketball team lost an unfortunate game in Hibbing, Minn. It was a very controversial overtime loss to North Woods that seemed to have the officials pitted against our team. The boys fought against the adversity but couldn't beat their opponents, losing in the semi-finals 75-71.

Another big piece of news for the community was the treaty right to hunt, fish, and gather in Wisconsin Ceded Territory. It took months of negotiations but was something that most of the community was glad to hear had been changed.

The end of March brought with it a major ruling in the Fond du Luth case. On Mar. 26, Chairwoman Karen Diver received a letter that the Department of Interior had cancelled the lease agreement involving the Fond du Luth case.

"This action by the Department of Interior clearly asserts that the second 25 years is not legal under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act and is actually consistent with the ruling out of the Federal Court as well as National Indian Gaming Commission notice. Now we have two federal agencies and the federal district court all taking some posture in favor of the Band," Chairwoman Diver said back in late March.

As the season began to turn to spring in April (for those of you who live off reservation, it really does come that late up here), Chairwoman Diver and University of Minnesota Duluth's Chancellor Lendley C. Black signed a Memorandum of Agreement providing support for the summer lacrosse camp (LAX-4-Life) for the youth that would take place in late July.

Summer came with graduations from both the college and high school and is traditionally a time when people's lives change. High school kids move on to college, college kids begin their careers in large numbers during the summer months.

Summer took an awful and violent turn. On June 20, the northland received several inches of rain, with the Fond du Lac neighborhood just outside of Duluth being hit the hardest. The Fond du Lac reservation, while not hit as hard did, however, see some of the most extreme roadway damage that most of us have ever or will ever see. Reservation road naturally took the biggest hit, and the storms devastation was unforgettable.

I still have pictures I took on my phone of the devastation on the following day, which were used in the paper back in July and every time I look at them I'm amazed. It seems like a lifetime ago that it happened, but at times also feels like just yesterday. It was during this natural disaster that I became really impressed with people in charge all around the reservation. I believe a Cultural Center is imperative in helping people with their spiritual fulfillment and learning the ways of our ancestors. A place where people

can learn to finish wild rice, make maple syrup, make their own regalia, conduct regular sweat lodges, and learn the language. Our language is a part of us, and if we lose it we lose our culture. I believe in this so strongly that I am willing to donate a portion of my salary towards language revitalization.



Something along the lines of a progressive incentive program to keep people coming back and learning. I would especially like to include elders in these teachings.

Another way to build the community and deter drugs is jobs. I would like to see our own store on Highway 210. A truck stop and auto mechanic garage would make good money as well as supply more jobs. I would also like to employ people year round for yard maintenance. Shoveling and salting driveways and sidewalks in the winter, and lawn care and community beautification in the summer. I would like to also start having training programs at the Sawyer Center, programs

to teach people a trade such as carpentry, computer programming, construction and such.

I have many more ideas. Some are mine, but a lot of them I have received from the community. I believe that if you want to represent the people and be their voice, you have to talk to them and listen to what they have to say. I know that I have the compassion and empathy needed to serve at this position because I can listen to people's concerns without judgment or prejudice. I want what everybody else wants, a good place to live my life and raise my family free of danger. Let me be your voice and let's do this together.

FDL Band member changes ideas for non-native designer

The following is an excerpt from an article on CNN.com. The following talks about Caleb Dunlap who is a Fond du Lac Band Member.

The ingredients of a mutually beneficial collaboration can be hard to nail down. Budding entrepreneur Mac Bishop knows how hard it is to toe that line as a non-Native. Born and raised in Portland, Oregon, the 23-year-old doesn't have any Native American ancestry. But, as a descendant of the Pendleton Wool family, which owns one of the country's longest-running wool

mills, famous for its Native-inspired blankets, he grew up with a strong interest in the culture and close ties to the community.

He was a sophomore at Cornell University in 2009 when he decided to launch a "social business" that celebrated Native American culture through apparel and art. It was around the time Native-inspired clothing was showing up on runways and in the pages of fashion magazines. But Bishop insists he wasn't trying to ride a trend. He wanted NATIVE(X) to showcase products that told a story.

He began with a pair of wool shorts made from Pendleton's "Chief Joseph" patterned fabric, named for the Nez Perce leader who resisted orders from the U.S. government to move his band onto a reservation. A few fashion blogs picked up on the "Chief Joe" shorts and Bishop ran Facebook ads targeted at users of Native American-related fan pages.

Not everyone was happy about it. When Caleb Dunlap, an Ojibwe from Northern Minnesota's Lake Superior Band, realized Bishop was not Native, Dunlap began posting comments

on Bishop's Facebook page accusing him of exploiting indigenous culture for financial gain.

"For me, it was like, 'Who is this guy who had the money to go to Cornell and start his own company? Why is he taking this Pendleton-looking stuff and making it into shorts? Be smarter, do your own thing,'" he said. "I wanted to convey to him that a Native person should be doing this."

A spirited exchange followed the wall posts, with Dunlap questioning Bishop's motives and Bishop insisting he was exploring a

sincere interest in Native culture with altruistic goals in mind. After that, the two didn't speak for nearly two years until Bishop contacted him after launching his website with a new perspective.

"I was naive in thinking I could build cultural awareness without that culture's involvement," Bishop said. "That conversation helped expose me to how controversial this could be and opened my eyes to the Native perspective on what's going on in the fashion industry."



Be a Healthy Role Model

January is near and New Year's resolutions have already been made. Even though it isn't New Year's Eve, I encourage everyone to add one more resolution now. Make a resolution to be a healthy role model, especially for children. ChooseMyPlate.gov states "A child's diet is largely influenced by his/her parent or guardian. It is important that parents model healthy behaviors and by doing so it shows children how to live a healthy lifestyle." This means the parent is the most important influence on a child. A child tends to copy his/her parents' behaviors. Listed below are some tips to get started on becoming a healthier role model.

• Plan family meals. Use this time to reconnect with each other. At family meals, children tend to eat more vegetables.

- Serve a variety of healthy foods and snacks. Aim to have a vegetable at every meal. Serve lean meats and other protein options such as eggs, fish, and beans. Have fruits and vegetables on hand and ready to eat for a quick snack. Choose whole grain breads and cereals for more fiber. Offer low-fat or nonfat dairy products.
- Limit fast food and low-nutrient snacks such as chips, cookies, and candy.
- Drink water. Limit or avoid sugary beverages like pop and juice.
- Be a role model yourself. Eat more vegetables and try new foods in front of your children.
- Involve the kids in the grocery shopping, preparing, and cooking of meals and snacks. When kids are involved they tend to eat better and it helps older children learn how to prepare food for when they are out on their own.
- Avoid food battles. Encour-

age the "one bite" rule, but don't force a child to clean their plate. Allow the child to decide if they are hungry and what they will eat from the food served. Parents control what foods are available to the child. Have set meal and snack times rather than allowing the child to "graze" all day.

- Show love with hugs, kisses, praise, and your time instead of food. Don't use food as a bribe or a reward.
- Limit screen time to no more than 2 hours a day. This includes television, movies, computers, video games, and texting.
- Encourage activity by including yourself. Plan family walks, hikes, bike rides, or sledding events. When was the last time you played tag?
- Don't smoke.

By adding one or two tips at a time to your routine, it'll soon become habit. Your health care provider, a dietitian, the WIC staff, the public health nurse, or the smoking cessation advisor are only a phone call away to help and answer questions. By March this year, you and your family could be on your way to a healthier lifestyle!.

SUICIDE ALERT!

In September of 2012 the Center for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta reported that the suicide rate in America went up 700% in the past 10 years. The CDC declared suicide to be an epidemic in this country since this is a seven-fold increase.

As a practicing psychologist for 35 years I have worked with many "suicide survivors." These include surviving parents, spouses, children, and siblings of the deceased who suicided. It is always extremely traumatic to surviving loved ones when someone kills themselves.

I have also worked with quite a few children who recently lost a parent to suicide. I can honestly say a child always blames themselves when a parent commits suicide.

For instance, I once had a 7 year old boy in my office whose mom suicided three weeks earlier. Through his sobbing he said, "If I wasn't so naughty my mommy would still be here!" Despite all my efforts I was unable to convince him that he was not the cause of his mother's death.

If you are considering suicide please keep in mind that you will be hurting all your loved ones if you do it. They will be worse off without you.

Reminders for those considering suicide:

1. You will NOT always feel as bad as you are feeling right now.
2. Many people do love you.
3. There is a way out of your current dilemma even if you cannot see it right now. There are lots of people just waiting to help you.
4. If you kill yourself it might be so painful for your loved ones they might do it too; including a child, possibly your own. When a parent commits suicide the odds of their children committing suicide goes way up compared to kids whose parent did not commit suicide.
5. Leaving a legacy of suicide to your children pretty much condemns them to a life of misery even if they do survive your death.
6. You probably have a special mission on this earth that you are supposed to complete before you leave.

Benjamin and Caroline (Gauthier) Cadotte Family

Research by Christine Carlson

Information about Benjamin Cadotte from Theresa Schenck's book *All My Relations*

Benjamin Cadotte was a distant cousin of the two Michel Cadottes. He entered the fur trade in 1810 and was first employed as a clerk by Michel Cadotte, Sr. at his Folle Avoine post on the St. Croix River (Abbott). After 1827 Benjamin Cadotte is found in the American Fur Company Account Books in the Northern Outfit, which included Lac du Flambeau, Lac Courte Oreille, and St. Croix (AFC-B, Reel 2). Schoolcraft described him in 1832 as "the senior trader at Ottawa Lake" (Lac Courte Oreille) who followed along with Schoolcraft's expedition to collect his credits at Rice Lake (Mason, 123). In 1837 he was licensed to trade at Yellow Lake in the St. Croix region (COIA, M234-Reel 387).

Benjamin Cadotte and Carolina Ginot and Charlotte Gauthier

Benjamin Cadotte was first married to Carolina Ginot. Their first daughter was Elizabeth who was born Nov. 15, 1834 at Yellow Lake. She was taken to LaPointe and was Father Baraga's first baptism. Benjamin Cadotte and Charlotte (Gauthier) were married on July 16, 1833. According to this, he may have had two wives around the same time.

1850 Census from LaPointe

The 1850 Census from LaPointe, Wisconsin shows family number 55 as Benjamin and Charlotte Cadotte. Benjamin was a voyager who was 66 years old. Charlotte was age 47. Their children were Augustine Cadotte a voyager age 24, Julian a voyager age 19, Charles age 11, Joseph age 8, Marie Cadotte and Angelique age 3. Benjamin Cadotte was born in Canada and his wife and children were all born in Wisconsin.

Charlotte Gauthier parent's names are Charles and Josette Gauthier. Most census reports are taken in the summer. Charlotte was living during the 1850 census but died on Sept. 26, 1850.

Benjamin Cadotte Moves to the Head of the Lakes after his wife Charlotte Died

In September of 1853 Francis Roy and Benj. Cadotte of La Pointe, located to Superior and erected houses, but the following winter disposed of their interests to Messrs. Wm H. Newton, Geo E. Nettleton, Benj. Thomas and others.

Stuntz Trading Post on Minnesota Point – From the book *Duluth and St. Louis County*

August Zachau, who after undergoing many privations, reached Superior in November of that year (1853), wrote, "We got into what is now Superior Bay just before dark on November 8, 1853, and landed on Minnesota Point, near where the old lighthouse stood and there found Benjamin Cadotte and Joe Londerer, two half-breeds building three log houses for George R. Stuntz. The whole point was dotted with big Indian tepees."

Superior, Wisconsin 1855 – God-parents Benjamin Cadotte and Carola Gauthier

This information is recorded in Baptismal Records from June 1855 to Aug. 1, 1888 from Superior, Wisc. On June 24, 1855, Philomena was baptized on 15 June 1855 at Fond du Lac. The parents were J. Baptiste Cadotte and Theresa LaGarde. The God-parents were Benjamin Cadotte and Carola Gauthier.

Benjamin Cadotte Dies

In a letter from the Superior Public Library, it states that there is a microfilm printout showing that Benjamin

Cadotte died on Oct. 15, 1858. Ben's great, great, great grand-daughter Lorraine Gaines from Tacoma, Wash. stated that he was buried at Wisconsin Point and his body was removed. She also said it took 35 years to settle his estate.

The Estate of Benjamin Cadotte One of the Earliest Settlers up in Probate Court – Superior Daily Call of Sept. 26, 1893

One of the oldest unsettled estates in the probate court was brought up this morning for a hearing. The estate is that of Benjamin Cadott, who died on the 15th of October, 1858 nearly 35 years ago. Cadotte was one of the earliest settlers in Superior having come in 1853 the same year and on the same boat with Vincent Roy. He immediately took up preemption within what is now old town at the request of the company that had charge of the founding of the future city. Cadott was then an old man being over 80 years of age.

As stated he died in 1858 and left a large family and quite an estate. His wife was half Indian and survived him. The children and heirs at law are now old people and are as follows: John Cadott, Cloquet, age 75; Charlotte Legault, of Barhow, age 70; Augustus Cadott, Cloquet, age 64 ;Rosella ? Landrel, Superior, age 57; Charles Cadott, Superior, age 55 and Angelina Rogers, Cloquet, age 46.

1905 Wisconsin State Census for Benjamin and Charlotte's son Charles Cadotte

Charles Cadotte was age 65 and was a common laborer. His wife was listed as Joe, a typographical error for Zoe who was 40 years old. Children are Charles Cadotte, Jr. a general laborer age 35, Ben J. Cadotte a grocery clerk age 32, Maggie Cadotte age 22, and George A. Cadotte age 20.

Grandson Benjamin J. Cadotte and the Legend of the Tamarack Tree

Chippewa Legend about the Tamarack Tree from the Evening Telegram of Apr. 19, 1944

The legend of the Tamarack Tree is also a story about a medicine man. This legend was told by a Chippewa here in Superior, old Ben Cadotte. There was once a medicine man who traveled around until he came to a house where an old man and his daughter lived. He stayed there for several days and the daughter fell in love with him. Her father took a dislike to the medicine man and wanted to get rid of him. He suggested that they go hunting for moose. That night after the men had made their camp and the medicine man was asleep, the father threw the man's moccasins in the fire. When the young man awoke he couldn't find his moccasins and could not go hunting without them. The father told him that he would go back and get some. The young men, suspecting a trick changed himself into a moose and got back before the father did. The next morning the same thing happened. The daughter then told her lover that her father was trying to get him away, so the young man started out again and did not return. The father started after him. It was very cold and the father lost his way and nearly froze to death, so he changed himself into a tree and it was a tamarack tree, and that is why the tamarack tree is always cold. The Indians say that if you are thirsty and come to a tamarack tree, you can always get a cold drink from its roots, no matter how warm the day is.

Improving Water Quality on Third Lake

Many of us pass by Third Lake on our way to and from work on Big Lake Road near Trettel Lane, unaware of the water quality problems on this lake. The Fond du Lac Environmental Program, Office of Water Protection, has been monitoring water quality on Third Lake for over 10 years. Among the problems we have identified include algae blooms, fish kills, and reduced water clarity. Many of the problems are caused by the historical and current farming operations near this lake. Algae blooms in lakes are caused

by excess nutrients in the water, such as phosphorus and nitrogen. These nutrients enter the water from the surrounding landscape. They can be recycled every year, causing ongoing problems with algae blooms. Take a look at the

photo of floating mats of algae on the surface of Third Lake. Algae blooms can lead to unsafe condi-

tions for swimming. They also cause reduced water clarity and they also lower the amount of dissolved oxygen in the water. Low oxygen levels can lead to fish kills, where large numbers of dead fish wash up on shore.

As stewards of this lake, the Office of Water Protection secured a grant from the US Environmental Protection Agency under the Clean Water Act's Non-Point Source Pollution grants program. For the past two years, we have conducted increased monitoring on the lake (including sediment samples and cores), and worked with landowners around the lake to reduce the amount of nutrients washing into the lake. This included partnering with the Fond du Lac Ojibwe School garden – they provided the funds to remove horse manure from a horse farm on the lake, which they were able to use as garden compost – a win-win situation for everyone.

Our last big accomplishment with this grant was to hire Sweetwater Technology to conduct an alum treatment on the lake in fall 2012. Alum, or aluminum sulfate, is used to treat drinking water and wastewater nationwide, and is commonly used to treat lakes with nutrient-related problems. In lake restoration, it works by binding excess nutrients in the water, including phosphorus, to the bottom of the lake where

it is unavailable to algae. Since Third Lake has had problematic algae blooms for many years, the alum treatment will help reduce algae blooms and improve water quality. This in turn may lead to more abundant submerged vegeta-

tion and an improved fishery.

We alerted the public to the alum treatment by publishing an article in the Fond du Lac newspaper and sending a letter to homeowners around Third Lake. We also discussed our work with the Reservation Business Committee and the Fond du Lac Conservation Committee. Here is a photo of the barge used to spray alum into the water. We noticed an immediate improvement in water clarity, and preliminary data taken after the alum treatment shows a marked reduction in nitrogen and phosphorus, especially in the deeper part of the lake. Though an alum treatment is not a permanent solution, we should see improved water quality for 7-10 years, and even longer if nutrient runoff from the surrounding watershed continues to be controlled. Ganawenim Gidakiiminaan Take Care of Our Earth: Recycle

In December, Fond du Lac's garbage and recycling services were consolidated with one carrier, Waste Management. As a result of this consolidation, recycling is now "single stream." This means all recyclables can be put into the same container, so you no longer have to separate cans, tin, paper, plastic, etc. Below is a list of both acceptable and unacceptable materials for

recycling. Please remember to rinse containers before putting them in the recycling bin. Miigwech for doing your part.

Acceptable

File/Office/Colored Paper, Manila Folders, Pamphlets, Brochures, Magazines, Catalogs, Phonebooks, Newspaper (no wire spirals!), Post-its, Adding Machine tape, register tape, shredded paper, carbonless paper, envelopes, glossy paper, ream wrappers; Plastics #1-7, All Colors of Glass bottles, Tin

Food Containers, Aluminum Beverage Cans

Unacceptable

Stencils, paper plates (or any serving material with food waste on it), thermal fax paper, plastic/shrink wrap, carbon paper, plastic cups or plates, three ring binders, photographs, paper wrappers from bandaids and other medical supplies, plastic grocery bags, Styrofoam

This facility is located across from the Ojibwe School.

Planning the Farm to School Program

Great news, in November, the Fond du Lac Ojibwe School was awarded a Farm to School planning grant by the USDA. They are one of only 32 schools in the whole country to receive the grant in this round. Farm to School means sourcing food directly from local farmers.

The Fond du Lac Farm to School planning team is still developing a plan that will work best for the Ojibwe School, but the Bimaaji'idiwin Ojibwe Garden Program demonstration garden will likely provide a large amount of produce for Ojibwe School lunches.

During the 2012 growing season, the demonstration garden provided lettuce, tomatoes, mesclun, (young, tender

greens) pea shoots, cabbage, kale, and tatsoi (dark green glossy leaves) for the Ojibwe School (much of the other produce went to community feasts, free farmers' markets, a free CSA, and the Cloquet Elderly Nutrition Program). For the 2013 growing season, we would like to get the students more involved with growing the food they will eat. The Fond du Lac Master Gardeners will help each grade plant a different crop in the spring and see it through from seed to harvest.

Anishinaabemowin Lessons

Consonants used in Ojibwe make nearly the same sounds that they do in English. The vowels are a little different though. Here they are:

i = ih (like the 'i' sound in 'it')
 ii = ee (like the 'e' sound in 'see')
 o = o (like the 'o' sound in 'oh')
 oo = oo (like the 'o' sound in 'boo')
 a = ah (like the 'u' sound in 'but')
 aa = aa (like 'a' sound in father')
 e = ay (like the 'a' sound in 'say')

Basic Rule for Ojibwe:

Daa = Tense marker meaning: should, would, or could.
 Agoodoo = 'S/he is snaring.'
 Daa-agoodoo. = 'S/he should snare.'

The tense marker daa- turned 'S/he is gambling.' to 'S/he should gamble.'
 Try practicing with other action words like: trapping 'wanii'ige', hunting 'gi-iwose', checking a trap 'naajiwanii'ige', etc.
