Tribal leaders attend President Biden speech in Superior, Wisc.

Dond du Lac Chairman Kevin Dupuis, Sr., and elected officials from Bad River Band of Lake Superior Chippewa and Red Cliff Band of Lake Superior, were in attendance at Earth Rider Brewery in Superior, Wisc. when President Biden spoke to a small gathering Jan. 25.

Before President Biden spoke, other area officials spoke touting the great significant impact that fixing the Blatnik bridge will have on the area's economy.

But with the Hwy 23 project that happened seven years ago, there are concerns about how this project will be handled. On the Minnesota side, things have been very well established, but there may still be cause for concern on the Wisconsin side.


"From our level there are steps being taken, I think we can clarify what steps are going to be made to ensure this is part of it, what we're working with on the Minnesota side of it with MnDOT and what the work is going to be done with WisDOT on Wisconsin side," Chairman Dupuis said of the plans with the Blatnik bridge. "I'm not going to say we're in the infant stage on this because the money has been there. Chang-

ing the wording of what they call 'an unanticipated discovery' to changing the meaning or wording. If we know where we're sitting at the largest culture corridor in the region, we know that there's more than four sites, that we know of, and probably more burial places, wouldn't we use this as a high probability on the other side instead of unanticipated discovery?"

With many different Tribes living in this area for thousands of years, changing the wording to "high probability" seems to best fit working in this area.

Many people will think that the Chairman and the other members of the Fond du Lac Council want to stop this project, but as the Chairman stated, that is not at all what Fond du Lac wants to do.

"There's part of it where we need to maintain on the government side, because we don't want to stop anything. That's what I want everybody to know. We don't want to stop anything because we know that when you stop something that affects families, it affects communities, and it affects the economy. But let's do the work to ensure that it doesn't get stopped," Chairman Dupuis said of making sure that once work begins it can continue smoothly since all of the prework



will have already been done at the site.

These preplanned strategies that the Chairman urged for may seem like a meticulous approach to the project, but ensuring that every phase is conducted correctly will help prevent mid-project setbacks.

While acknowledging the challenges ahead, Chairman Dupuis continues to express optimism that a collective effort and strategic plan will lead to a successful and culturally sensitive completion of the Blatnik Bridge project, benefitting both Minnesota and Wisconsin communities.

oozhoo Families, We are now half way through the school year. With a few major changes and challenges we have made it this far; I am grateful for you all understanding and supporting the changes we have made. The metal detector process and procedures had a few issues but now run smoothly. We not only use the metal detectors for the students at the beginning of every school day, we also use them for basketball games and community events. I appreciate your patience with this change.

This year we held Anishinaabe Quiz Bowl here at the school. We had nine participating teams. We currently have two teams at the Ojibwe School that will be participating in the upcoming Anishinaabe Quiz Bowl in Walker in March. We have taken home one second place trophy this year. Migwech to the coaches and students who participate in this important competition. Your time and effort put into language and culture does not go unnoticed!

One of the challenges we've faced this year is not having enough Special Education teachers at the school. This issue seems to be nationwide. We have posted several times for Special Education teachers and have not had any applicants. We have recently asked to be a part of the Northern Lights Cooperative and we are waiting to hear if they can accommodate our needs. This is frustrating for us and I am sure for those families who are on a waiting list for admission to the school. I apologize for this inconvenience and I want you to know we are trying to solve this issue. It may take some time.

It is an uphill climb coming out of pandemic times and there are huge adjustments we are all making. Attendance in school is one of the adjustments that have been on our radar. It is important that your child be in school and be ready to learn. There have been a number of referrals to truancy court this year and we want families to let us know how we can help them with getting to school everyday.

We are very fortunate to have Officer Paro in our building as our School Resource Officer. He has been a helpful part of our team at the Ojibwe School. He has connections with most of our students and is a member of our community. This really helps when it comes to our students. Officer Paro has presented topics to our staff and our students and takes care of daily issues and concerns staff and students have.

Legislation has passed the Indigenous Education for All Act. The state of Minnesota has allotted Fond du Lac Reservation \$50,000 to gather information from our people on what we want public schools in Minnesota to know about us here at Fond du Lac Reservation, our history, our language, and our culture. If you are interested in being a part of this group I will have more information coming soon.

I have recently been appointed the Tribal Nations Education Committee representative for Fond du Lac Reservation. I will be attending TNEC meetings and setting up tribal consultations with other school districts. This appointment will require me to travel around Minnesota to other schools and Reservations.

The Ojibwe School cafeteria has had a successful first half of the school year. The students are enjoying many fresh and locally sourced food items offered on the daily fruit and vegetable bar. We also continue to serve culturally relevant menu items throughout each month. To celebrate Native American Heritage Month in November, the students were served chicken wild rice soup, fried walleye with wild rice, ground venison nachos, bison wild rice

meatballs, Hawaiian BBQ chicken, chicken pozole soup, and 3 Sisters chili. In March, we will be doing March Menu Madness! Students will be able to vote daily between two commonly served entrees to determine the student's favorite meal!

The Fond du Lac Ojibwe School Harvest of the Month Team has had several opportunities to share their presentation on incorporating culturally relevant foods in the school cafeteria. They shared their experience at the Minnesota Harvest of the Month state-wide meeting in October and the USDA Food Nutrition Programs Midwest Regional Office in December, Also in December, the Institute for Agriculture & Trade Policy visited the Ojibwe School as they will be writing a Farm to School Spotlight article about our Farm to School and overall School Nutrition Program. The team also presented at the 13 Moons Gichi Manidoo Giizis Sustainable Agriculture and Natural Resources Conference in January. 
FDL Ojibwe School Quiz Bowl Competition

State of the Band

FDL's State of the Band address: a year of triumphs

The Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa held its State of the Band address Feb. 16 at the Black Bear Casino Resort's Otter Creek Convention Center to a room full of interested Band members, community members, and state and other public officials, providing an overview of the achievements and challenges faced within our community in 2023. The event was marked by a sense of optimism and gratitude, with leaders of the Fond du Lac Community acknowledging the contributions of Band members, FDL employees, the success of various projects, and the ongoing commitment to preserving the Band's cultural

Roger Smith, Sr., District III Representative for the Brookston District, covering the northern half of Fond du Lac within Saint Louis County, opened the address by extending a warm welcome to all Band members, emphasizing the importance of community cohesion. As vice-chair he expressed awe at the talent displayed by the young members of the school band, not forgetting to mention those in the drum groups also.

Smith spoke passionately about the importance of passing on traditions to the next generation and the reassurance that the youth would carry them forward. The mention of their accomplishments in music and dance set a positive tone for the address, suggesting a promising future for Fond du Lac.

"When I hear things like that, I reflect and think that we're going to be okay," Smith, Sr. said after hearing the music the band played and the drum groups performances. "They got us and they're going to carry on our traditions and things like that for Fond du Lac. And to see the little ones out here dancing and representing Fond du Lac is simply amazing."

Smith also highlighted the successful completion of the regional water project within the Brookston district, ensuring that households in the area now have access to the best water in north-

east Minnesota. The project also introduced a vital water supply system for fire protection in rural areas, showcasing the Band's commitment to the well-being of its members.

Acknowledgment was given to the dedicated staff in various divisions responsible for the success of the water project, including public works managers, water managers, and wastewater operators. Smith expressed gratitude for their expertise and efficiency, with special mention of a visit from the IHS Director, who was impressed by the Band's water treatment plant.

"These folks are amazing at what they do and their knowledge and operations of the water treatment plant is simply amazing," Smith said of those who worked tirelessly to bring clean water to his district. "Earlier this last year, we had the director of IHS come to Fond du Lac and there was a specific reason why she came here. It was the tour of our water treatment plant and the tour that these folks gave, blew her away.

And when she looked at it, she asked 'How did you folks do this and how can they replicate that through all Indian country?'"

The State of the Band also featured an historic victory for Fond du Lac, but it wasn't just FDL's victory it was a victory for all of Indian Country. The Band successfully opposed a global mining conglomerate, PolyMet, preventing the potential threat to the water quality and resources of the Band and many others in the watershed. Notably, Fond du Lac became the first Tribe ever to have an Army Corps of Engineers permit revoked due to concerns about wastewater violating advanced water quality standards.


"These were huge and historic victories for all of Indian country," Smith, Sr. said of protecting our waters for current and future generations. "We simply did not have this success without staff of resource management, our legal division, and our outside counsel."

Further victories were achieved at the Minnesota Supreme Court,


ruling against the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency's decision, reinforcing the importance of environmental protection. The Band emphasized its stand against irresponsible mining that could negatively impact natural resources and water quality standards.

Addressing the challenges faced in the coming year, Rob Abramowski, Secretary/Treasurer highlighted the Band's commitment to a transitional approach, seeking different perspectives and community input in decision-making processes. A particular focus for the year ahead will be addressing homelessness and addiction simultaneously, showcasing a dedication to social issues that affect community members directly.

"My main thing that I'd really look forward to working on this year is the homelessness problem and addiction. So I made them both go hand-in-hand and those are things that kind of need to be worked on simultaneously," Abramowski said during the event of what his main focus in 2024

has and will be. "We are taking steps to do some one and two bedroom homes with some of the remaining funding that we have for housing but also the housing grant itself. So we can lessen some of the hurdles and help people to come out of homelessness and try to make it an easier transition. Then also give them a an amount of time to kind of get things together where it actually is a transition and they kind of get to a point where they can get a job and get to a point where they are in a good place."

Abramowski also spoke about the completion of the wage study, coupled with a reinvestment of approximately \$11 million into the Fond du Lac workforce, an effort to help bring in and retain the best and most talented individuals in the workforce today. While acknowledging ongoing challenges, the secretary expressed optimism about the future, citing increased hiring and a commitment to addressing policy nuances.


Abramowski, who saw positives in the financials for the 2023 year also discussed wanting to diversify Fond du Lac's income streams and not rely so heavily on gaming, which is why he addressed the Band venturing into cannabis facilities and exploring opportunities in that realm.

"And we're going to be doing a pro-operation and probably retail and possibly manufacturing," Abramowski said about FDL's ventures into cannabis production. "It looks pretty promising too. So we'll be really diversified in a way that something that we could compete competitively with, with gaming as well. Even though you know some of the numbers really do look promising. I think it's definitely a risk we can take. I was apprehensive at first because I didn't know how that's all going

to affect our kids. And you know, what kind of message would that send? But in a way, we were kind of forced into it, because if we

didn't do it somebody else would and we needed to take advantage of that."

This calculated risk, though initially met with apprehension, reflects a forwardlooking approach to securing the Band's financial future

while acknowledging changing priorities in the wake of the pandemic.

The secretary underscored the Band's commitment to supporting family members and businesses through opportunities, infrastructure development, and proactive engagement. Projects such as the Event Center expansion and property acquisition showcase a strategic approach to community growth beyond the gaming sector.

A master plan concept, developed in collaboration with planning staff, which offers a glimpse into a forward-looking, diversified future for the community. Encouraging community input, the secretary emphasized the importance of aligning development initiatives with the desires of the residents.

With so much already said by the other members of the Council, Kevin Dupuis, Sr., Fond du Lac

Chairman, spoke strongly about the Band and what he sees as significant concern.

With retirees leaving and transi-

tions in other positions occurring, the Chairman is concerned about losing valuable knowledge and experience that these longterm FDL employees take with them before passing on their knowledge.

"What they take with them is institutional memory that sometimes we can't har-

ness or find ways to harness that. It's important things that need to be done. And so it's really important. I need to take a look at how

we're going to harness that information, that institutional memory that they walk out the door with," Chairman Dupuis stressed about how Fond du Lac has many emplovees with years of service that we can't afford to lose. "Because it's history. They created something for the Band, it doesn't matter what administration it was or who they worked for, everything that moves forward and we're going to change administration, we're going to have new elections. You can have new people sit in, but the Band has always started from here and we're here picking up where other people have left off on the administrative side. But the one thing that we have attached from administration to administration is the institutional memory."

Chairman Dupuis stressed the importance of finding ways to harness this institutional memory for the benefit of the community, as it holds the history and vital information that transcends different generations.

Many of Fond du Lac's successes over the years wouldn't be possible without the help from others,

and Chairman Dupuis acknowledged that, thanking city, state, and federal officials and many others who were in attendance.

"So when you look around. some may ask, 'why are there other people in the room?' I have to say, because we have partners that have helped us fight battles for Fond du Lac and I don't know if everybody understands that," Chairman Dupuis stated before thanking many in attendance including Jim Paine, Superior, Wisc Mayor, Jenny Van Sickle, Superior City Councilor, and several who weren't there including Betty Mc-Collum, Congresswoman, Senator Amy Klobuchar, Senator Tina Smith, and other local elected officials.

Despite the difficulties Fond du Lac has overcome during the pandemic, our elected officials remained optimistic about the Band's future, encouraging positive choices and collective efforts for the benefit of all. As Fond du Lac continues on its upward trajectory, the community can anticipate a future guided by careful decision-making, inclusivity, and a commitment to positive change.

Wood Stoves: Burning Wood Efficiently and Safely

Many are familiar with the presence of wood stoves in homes and cabins. A crackling ishkode (fire) can be a comforting heat source in the home, or maybe an occasional treat as a back up to other primary heating systems on cold winter days. However, it's very important to maintain wood stoves and fuels properly for the health of you and your loved ones!

Smoke from burning wood is a mixture of unhealthy gasses and fine particles. Some of these gasses include benzene, formaldehyde, acrolein, and polycyclic

aromatic hydrocarbons. Fine particles, also known as particulate matter, can also be harmful to our health, and should be moderated when possible. Increased exposure to particle pollution can have negative health impacts on your cardiovascular system (increasing risk of heart attack and stroke) and respiratory system (aggravating lung disease or triggering asth ma attacks). Particulate Matter is an air quality pollutant that Fond du Lac continuously monitors for; you can see what the outdoor air quality is like here at Fond du Lac any time of the year at https:// www.airnow.gov/. Burning wood more efficiently can create less smoke, and reduce the risks of negative health impacts for your

How can you burn wood more efficiently? Properly maintained wood stoves burn effectively, and newer models boast safer designs and improved efficiencies. A comparison from the U.S. EPA claims that older, uncertified stoves release 15 to 30 grams of smoke per hour (g/h), while new EPA-certified stoves exude around 4.5 g/h. A lower g/h rating generally denotes a more efficient stove. EPA Certification labels can typically be found on the back of certified stoves, or they may be listed on the EPA's website.

Another way to burn wood more efficiently is to dry it. Burning dry, seasoned wood promotes a hotter ishkode with less smoke production. You can test your wood with a wood moisture meter to ensure appropriate dryness: 20% moisture or less burns best. Ensuring that proper airflow is fed to the flame and reducing the time that ishkode smolders can also help reduce smoke. There are other heating methods which avoid the health concerns associated with wood smoke entirely, such as heat

pumps. If you have concerns regarding smoke within your home, consider updating your old stove or installing a different home heating system.

The Fond du Lac Air Program has partnered with Environmental Initiative over the last year to help income eligible tribal and nontribal members of our community upgrade old wood stoves for little to no cost. We were able to assist 6 households in our community this dagwaagin (fall), and we'd love to help more! Qualifying income eligibility programs are listed on our flier, which can be viewed on the Fond du Lac Website, or in this newspaper. The following is an excerpt from Election Ordinance revised December 11, 2023, which states voting requirements.

Section 1.6. Voter Eligibility. 1.6(A). Judging Qualifications.

Each Band governing body will be the sole judge of the constitutional qualifications of its voters and may by official action, delegate this responsibility to its General Reservation Election Board.

1.6(B). Eligibility to Vote: Generally.

Eligible voters are enrolled members of the Tribe, 18 years of age or over. All eligible voters shall vote by secret ballot. To be eligible to cast a ballot a voter must meet all constitutional requirements. In addition, to be eligible to cast a vote for Committeeperson. a voter must have resided within that district for at least thirty (30) days immediately preceding the election, unless the voter casts an absentee ballot as permitted by this Ordinance.

1.6(C). Eligibility to Vote: Absentee.

Whenever, due to absence from the reservation, illness or physical disability, an eligible voter is not able to vote at the polls and notifies the General Election Board consistent with this Ordinance, he/she will be entitled to vote by absentee ballot in the manner and under the procedures as provided by Section

2.2(B). To cast an absentee ballot for Committeeperson, an eligible voter must have resided within that district for a period of at least thirty (30) days as his/her last reservation residence. In the event an eligible voter has never resided on the reservation of his/her enrollment, he/she may declare in his/her request which district has been selected in which to cast the ballot for Committeeperson. If an eligible voter does not and has not previously designated a district, that eligible voter may cast an absentee ballot that includes only the at-large positions up for election. Once a voter has resided in or declared a district, the voter may not thereafter change his/ her district for absentee voting purposes without actually residing within a different district on his/ her reservation of enrollment for at least thirty (30) consecutive

days immediately preceding the election.

What is your "why" for seeking recovery? Prior to my addiction getting severe, I had started college and had goals. By the end of my addiction I was homeless and lost literally everything that meant anything. My "why" was more of a "why not," I had nothing to lose by finally beginning recovery.

How can people best support you during this time? The best way that people can support me at this point in my recovery is by being an ear when I may need one. And by also asking me for

help if they need it. As they say, you have to give it away to keep it.

Are there any self-care techniques that help to keep you grounded and sober? The number one thing is the medicines.
Praying. Sage, cedar, sweet grass. I smudge when I am feeling out of sorts. Especially with Bear Root.

What are some healthy coping mechanisms that you use to manage uncomfortable feelings? I go to meetings, have a sponsor, and continue to work the steps. But I also go to ceremonies and use cultural practices. They say that the 12-step programs are spiritual and our culture give me the specific instructions for how to practice the 12-steps. By practicing these things on a daily basis

when I have a problem I don't even have to think about what to do, it's natural to apply the program and our culture to those uncomfortable feelings.

Do you have any tips for maintaining sobriety in early recovery? Seek to find what your purpose in life is. There are three questions we should ask ourselves: Who am I? Why am I? Where am I going? And I think once we figure that out we stop fighting reasons to stay sober and start working on our recovery. And find a community of likeminded people to surround yourself with, weather that's 12-steps, culture, college, etc. Community is important.

What would you like me to know about recovery? Recovery

is beautiful and fulfilling. But it is also hard work. I think a lot of people think that because you are sober you shouldn't have cravings, or that if they do they are doing something wrong. There is nothing wrong with having those thoughts, that's how we dealt with life for a long time. What's important is to talk about them, so that they lose their power.

How has your life changed since entering recovery? Not only do I have those "things" that I lost to my addiction, but I am a better person. I have friendships today that are unwavering. I am the person that I want to be, and I get to always be improving. Life is far better than I could have hoped for.

What are some activities

that bring positivity into your life? Making Ribbon skirts or beaded earrings, spending time with my 5-month-old daughter, going to meetings and out to eat after with friends, attending recovery conventions or campouts.

Are there any ways that the community can help you to stay motivated in your recovery journey? This motivation to stay sober has to come from within; but I will say that seeing others gain confidence in their own recovery makes what I do more worthwhile.

What is one fun fact about you as a person? I love to collect agates

- Whole-grain bread, 4 slice(s), toasted

Method

Place shredded zucchini into a clean tea towel, gather the edges and squeeze the excess liquid. Discard liquid.

Preheat the oven to broil. Whisk the mustard and eggs together until well combined.

Heat the olive oil in the base of 7-inch (base), 10-inch (top) non-

stick ovenproof frying pan over medium heat. Add the onion, cook for 1 minute stirring occasionally, until soft. Add the zucchini and tomatoes, cook for 5 minutes until the vegetables have softened and the moisture has evaporated. Stir in the Swiss chard and half the cheddar cheese. Spread evenly over the pan. Dollop over the ricotta.

Pour over the egg mixture and allow the egg to run to the base. Cook for 4 minutes or until the egg is almost set. Sprinkle the remaining cheese.

Place the pan under the broiler for 2 to 3 minutes or until the top is set and lightly golden. Scatter over

the parsley or basil. Season to taste with black pepper. Cut in half and serve with slices of toast.

arch is National Nutrition Month. National Nutrition Month has been around for over 50 years. It was started by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics to encourage people to learn about making informed food choices and developing healthful eating and physical activity habits.

Each year has a different theme and each week has a different focus. This year, the theme is Beyond the Table. It focuses on nutrition during food production and distribution and for the consumer in the grocery store and farmers' markets.

According to eatright.org, the weekly focuses are:

Week 1: Stay nourished on any

- Learn cooking, food preparation and meal planning skills
- Use a grocery list and shop the sales when purchasing food
- · Learn about community resourc-

es such as SNAP, WIC and local food banks

Practice home safety.

Week 2: See a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist

- Ask your doctor for a referral to an RDN
- Find an RDN who specializes in your unique needs
- Receive personalized nutrition information to meet your health
- Learn about the many ways RDNs can help live healthier lives. Week 3: Eat a variety of foods from all food groups
- Include your favorite cultural foods and traditions
- Eat foods in various forms, including fresh, frozen, canned and dried
- Experiment with recipes using different ingredients
- Try new foods or global cui-

Week 4: Eat with the environment in mind

- Get creative with leftovers and ways to reduce waste
- Enjoy more plant-based meals and snacks

Ingredients


- 1 Tablespoon toasted sesame oil or coconut oil
- 1-2 garlic cloves, minced
- 3-4 cups cooked quinoa, chilled (time tip: precook

the quinoa the day before)

- 1 16-ounce bag of frozen vegetables, any variety
- 2 large eggs
- 2-3 Tablespoons soy sauce
- ½ tsp ground ginger (optional) Instructions
- 1. Heat the oil and garlic in a large skillet or wok over mediumhigh heat, stirring until fragrant, about 30 seconds
- 2. Add guinoa and veggies and cook until veggies start to soften and coated in flavoring, about 2 minutes. Push mixture to the

side of the pan and crack both eggs directly onto the hot skillet. Scramble with a fork until cooked through. Stir into quinoa-veggie mixture

- 3. Pour soy sauce over mixture, sprinkle with ginger and toss to combine, cooking for another 1-2 minutes. Adjust seasonings according to taste
- 4. Serve immediately

A message from FDLHSD

IV is spreading in our community. Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) is an infection that spreads through sex or by sharing needles and can exist in the body for years without causing symptoms. American Indian/Alaska Native people in Minnesota are twice as likely to be diagnosed with HIV as white people. There is no cure for HIV, and left alone it is fatal. But there are modern treatments that help people with HIV be well and

live normal lives. It is time for us to protect ourselves and our people. HIV testing is recommended for everyone as a part of routine healthcare. Know your body, know your

We are starting a program at Min No Aya Win and Centers for American Indian Resources clinics to test all people between the ages of 15 and 65 for HIV at least once per year. HIV testing is for everyone, regardless of age, gender, or risk. We don't want to miss

anyone, and we want people to see HIV testing as a routine part of the care they get from their clinic.

The HIV test is run on a finger prick that will be collected by the person rooming you. Your provider will give you results that same day. You can decline the test. But we hope that you will participate in this program to help stop HIV's spread through our community and to get treatment to people living with HIV!

Ella was always there for her daughters and granddaughters for whatever they were going through in life. She was very proud of her great-grandson Ryker who brought joy to her.


